One thing we find is the attitude of the school's populace toward DMACC, something that when we were in high school was labeled "school spirit".

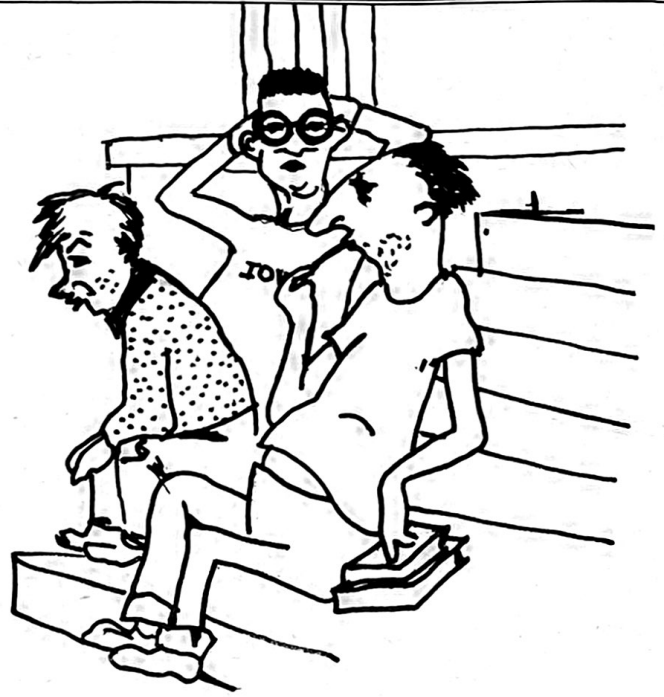

I happen to believe an abortion is the taking of a human life. I am not able to think of it as murder, because of the many women who undergo it feeling overwhelmed by reasons to do so: for them, it is the "least of the evils" open to them.

I am committed also to the belief that each person must follow his or her own conscience and has the right to as much information as possible when deciding how to act. That's why the Health Service offers this series, affirming that the only free choice is an informed one.

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ABORTION: an easy way out

Abortion is just like death . . . people never think about it until they have to. I was just like everyone else, I didn't until I had to and it was hard then to get my head together about it.

There were good arguments both ways, but I guess that in the back of my mind I knew as soon as I knew I was pregnant that I would get an abortion. But even though I thought the Supreme Court decision opening up abortion for all who wanted it was a good one; all of a sudden I had to personally reconcile myself to the fact that conceivably, I might be killing a human life.

An abortion is a relatively easy procedure, only physically painful as long as the doctor and his assistants are performing it, however, the damage an abortion does to a person's mental state lingers.

You have plenty of time to think about it. Usually it's at least a week from the pregnancy test to the actual day that the abortion is performed. However, during that week you feel like you're performing an abortion on your mind. You think about it during classes, while you're eating, while you're watching T.V. and at night when you're trying to get the sleep you know your body needs.

Every time someone mentions the word "baby" you cringe a little inside. When you watch a medical show you know that soon, someone will be wheeling you down a hospital corridor. Food hasn't tasted the same for weeks anyway, and now you really couldn't eat it if it did. Anyone's glance at you seems almost obscene and you wonder if they know, although you're sure they couldn't.

Is it life, or isn't it? That's what you wonder about. If you decide not to have an abortion, would you be willing to give up the baby to an adoption agency? Or would you decide to keep it? Do you have the money for an abortion? Well then, do you really have the money to support a child? And what do you tell the father?

You know that you have to tell him. After all its part his. Finally you just blurt it out and wait for a reaction. It's slow in coming and you find that he is just as confused as you.

Finally, after a loud discussion and some bitter words, the two of you agree. Neither one of you is ready to accept a child right now and he doesn't want you to go through the ridicule of a pregnancy either. An abortion is the only alternative.

Friday you have a physical and a Pap test is done. They blood-type you and then explain the procedure. The fear of the unknown, even though it's been explained, creeps up. It just gets worse through the weekend.

Tuesday, you report back in. This is the day they will insert a laminaria. This is a small piece of seaweed that through some biological property, produces some bleeding. They have explained to you that once it is inserted, you cannot back out, that it will be too late.

Wednesday is the day that you have both looked forward to, and at the same time dreaded. You walk into the waiting room and find five or six other girls silently sitting there. They, too, are there for the same reason as you. Once the doctor is started, the girls will be taken at 20 minute intervals as though they were on an assembly line.

The nurse takes your blood pressure and you sign a release. She explains to you that this is in case something goes wrong, as it seldom does, so they can rush you to surgery immediately. You draw numbers with the other girls, and find that you will be next to last.

The first girl is taken into a room and prepped for the procedure. The only anesthetic given is a shot of novocaine in one hip and darvon in the other. They wheel her down the hall and start prepping another girl.

Finally, the first girl is wheeled back in. She is as white as she can get and no sooner gets in the room before she faints. The second girl is eventually brought back. She looks better and is managing a weak smile.

And then it is your turn. They prep you and you make a feeble attempt at a joke as they take you out of the room. You travel the hall and find the doctor "taking five" with a cigarette. You chat a little bit trying to muster a semblance of relaxation.

He takes a last draw and then they take you into a small room which won't hold much more than the table they have laid you on and the doctor and his two assistants. They give you two more shots and then you find out that one assistant is there only to hold your hands.

You soon find out why they need her. The procedure they are going to do on you is a suction method. Soon you find out this is little more than a special vacuum cleaner inserted to draw the fetus out. As they start the machine you can't watch what is happening any longer because all you can feel is the pain.

You grab the hands of the nurse and squeeze. She squeezes back and makes small talk, all the while trying to hold you in place on the table. During the ten or so minutes it takes, all you feel is pain while you wonder how bad it will hurt later.

Finally, it is all over and they wheel you back. You find out that the pain is gone and all of a sudden you are very hungry. Someone gets you something to eat and you're given some medicine to take. You just feel the relief of being away from that machine.

After a half hour they let you get out of bed to get dressed. They give you some more medicine to take later and an appointment to come back the next Friday for a checkup. A little over four hours after you walked in the doors you find yourself walking back out with no trouble. It's all over . . .

. . . Or is it, because you're still thinking. It's been six months and I'm still wondering . . .

Increased Enrollment Reported

Total enrollment for the fall quarter at DMACC has again increased this year for full-time students. There are now 2306 full-time students at DMACC compared with 2192 full-time students for the 1973 fall quarter.

There was a slight drop in the enrollment for part-time students, with 891 part-time students in comparison to 965 students for the fall quarter the year before.

In the Career Education Division there are 1507 full-time students and in the Arts and Science Division 799 full-time students. There are 78 part-time students in the Career Education Division and 813 part-time students in the Arts and Sciences.

For the fall quarter of 1973 there were 1448 full-time students in the Career Education Division and 744 full-time students in the Arts and Science Division. There were 159 part-time students in the Career Education Division and 806 full-time students in the Arts and Science Division.

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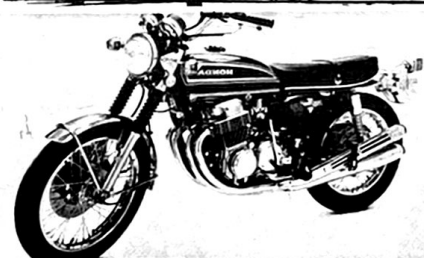
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Changes In Student Senate Elections

Dale Wagner, Director of Student Activities, recently stated changes have been made for more direct representation in election procedures at DMACC.

In past elections, seven senators were elected at-large, and fourteen were elected from the career and general education departments in proportion to their size, making a total of twenty-one senators. As the number of students increased, each senator was compelled to represent more students than originally planned.

This fall, individual career education programs will elect one senator for every fifty students. The number of students in career education

will be compared to the number of general education students to determine how many senators will be elected from the Arts and Sciences Department. According to Wagner, this new method will better represent each program and its needs.

Any students with a paid activity fee will be eligible to vote in this election. Previously only full-time students were eligible. Elections will be held Oct. 4 in Bldgs. 2 and 25.

Those wishing to run for an office on the Executive Board, or for Student Senator, may pick up applications in the Student Activities office in Bldg. 3. Applications must be turned in by 3:00 p.m., tomorrow.

★ VETERAN'S VOICE

The Des Moines Area Community College Veterans Association wishes to extend its hand of friendship to all veterans at DMACC. We wish to share our experiences with all new and returning veteran students to deal with any problems you may incur. Our goal is to make your academic careers as successful as possible. Through close fellowship with other veterans on campuses across the nation we can enhance these college years.

We urge you to attend this year's first meeting. It will be held Wednesday, Sept. 25, at 1:00 in the Little Theater, Building 24. We will discuss the club's goals and direction it should take to secure a new adequate GI Bill. I hope to see you there.

A main objective of our association is to keep abreast of national and state legislation concerning veterans. We then inform all our members and take action (writing letters, telephoning, telegraphing, and lobbying) to gain more favorable legislation.

We are now faced with the most crucial time period in the GI Bill's history. For months the Congress has been battling between Houses to write the new GI Bill. With last week's action we are no further in gaining the new bill than we were in February. The Senate wrote a bill which was acceptable to this association criteria. Now the House has unanimously voted a lesser bill that is totally inadequate to meet the needs of today's college veteran. Details of both bills will be discussed at the first meeting this quarter. The Congress has eliminated articles of the bill that would pay for a portion of our tuition. The main argument against the article was that it would be impossible to administer and the abuses would follow. Are we to believe that Congress is incapable of writing an adequate bill? The WW II veterans received tuition payments. Are we less worthy of assistance than WW II veterans? If the Congress is concerned with

inflation they should consider that the money spent on the WW II GI Bill was repaid to the government four times over by the additional taxes paid by veterans when they received their degrees and higher paying jobs.

Inflation strikes hardest the people on fixed incomes. The elderly, the handicapped, the underprivileged, and the veteran suffer the blow of inflation, not the rich. Yet now the Congress proposes a 23% increase. This year food prices have increased 15%, housing has increased 18%, and all other necessities have increased.

Action is needed immediately, by the Congress and by we, the veterans. What can you do? Believe it or not you can do much. This is to benefit yourself and all future veterans. Many see this as the last chance to increase the GI Bill unless America becomes involved in another conflict. This is your last chance.

Drake's Pass Catching Threat: Mike Murphy

Drake coach Jack Wallace seems to come up with outstanding pass receivers year after year.

This year, Mike Murphy, a six-foot three-inch, 189 lb. senior has emerged as a standout after Drake's first two games. Murphy, a native of Dallas Center, has caught nine passes in two games and is averaging 12.5 yards per catch. Against Dayton on September 7, he caught three passes and grabbed six against West Texas State on September 14, one was good for a touchdown.

Murphy's height lets him catch the high passes, but he also has good moves and sure hands. Repeatedly against

West Texas State, he made tough catches while being double-teamed.

Drake lost their first two games which were at home. The first, 21-7 against Dayton and the second, 37-11 against West Texas State.

With Murphy catching passes, Drake's future looks good. They also have a number of other standouts such as tailback Jerry Heston, a former Ankeny prep and Jonas Sears who can run and pass well.

Drake will have to eliminate its mistakes, fumbles and interceptions if it wants to win. The next Drake home game is October 5 against North Texas State.

AAU Walk-Run

Planned On

Campus

On Saturday, September 28th at 2:00 P.M. there will be a six mile run-walk on the DMACC campus sponsored by the A.A.U. and directed by Gary Wilcox, Director of General Education. Mr. Wilcox predicts there will be about 50 contestants.

The divisions include: an Open Walk, Open Run, Open High School, Junior High and below, and a women's division. The run will cover three laps along the campus road from Building 4 to up around the loop at the other side of the campus. Anyone interested can compete.

Parking Changes

Initiated

Vehicle registration fees have been changed this year, from one dollar per quarter to three dollars per year. Several other regulations have also been altered.

Parking permits for two-wheeled and three-wheeled vehicles may only be displayed on the handlebars. Before they could be placed anywhere they were visible on these vehicles.

To help pedestrians safely cross the road running through the campus, portable stop signs have been placed at the entrance of parking lots K and D.

Before the latest revisions were made, metered parking in Lot K was unlimited. Now a time limit of thirty minutes has been set, any vehicle parked for a longer period of time will be ticketed.

A new section on appealing a traffic or parking violation has been added to the parking and traffic regulations pamphlet. The section tells when, where, and how to file an appeal. It also restricts the appellant from appearing a decision more than once unless the decision resulted from a split vote with two favorable votes.

Lot K, in front of Building 24, has been changed from student, staff, and visitor parking to strictly staff and visitor parking. Lot H, in front of

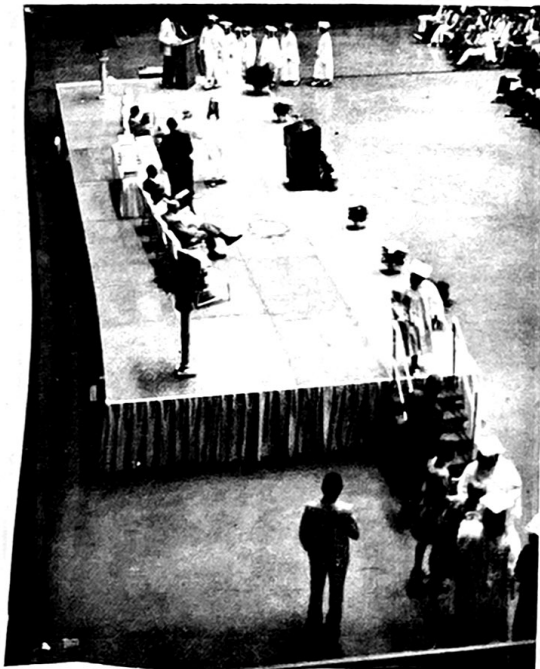
Building 31 Nears Completion
