PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES

Greg Snyder

Greg Snyder is a Tool and Die student who has served one term in the student senate. He is presently acting president of the senate following the resignation of Debbie Simon.

Last fall only 10 percent of the student body bothered to vote. The newspaper staff can only hope that this year is better and that when the Stu-dent Senate asks for something for you, the student this year, the senate can truly say they represent the student body.

Rogers says he ran "to be of help to our college in a way that just may possibly bring more enthusiasm to college life and activities."


He beleives the student senate exists to make DMACC useful to the students and faculty "at it's highest ability."

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Baseball's Fastest Pitcher

Major league baseball players have long speculated on which pitcher can throw the fastest. That speculation ended on Sept. 7, when Nolan Ryan of the California Angels, threw a pitch against the Chicago White Sox' BeeBee Richard that was measured at 100.8 mph by a radar timing device. Ryan is officially the fastest pitcher ever recorded. American League batters

American League batters have known for a long time that Ryan could throw hard. He has led the Major League in strikeouts for two years and is leading again this year by a wide margin.

In the past three years Ryan has struck out over 300 batters per season with a record 384 batters last year. He struck out 19 Boston Red Sox on Aug. 12 this year to tie a Major League record.

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

The Des Moines Area Com-munity College Veterans' Association held its first two meetings September 23rd and 25th. Total attendance was 28 veterans, all who showed interest in getting the ball rolling to gain the associations's goals. Areas of interest were setting up a fund raising project, writing legislation for proposals to the lowa Senate, studying becoming a foster parent club for a South Viet-namese orphan, and becom-ing more politically oriented. The association was pleas

ed to announce that since the Veterans' Loan Fund was es-tablished in mid-summer temporary loans have been granted to 53 veteran students. The capital used has been continuously turned over to supply a total of more than \$4,500 in temporary loans to veteran students. The associa-tion is hopeful that this project will continue to be as successful in the future as it has in the recent past. The association has great

hopes that the upcoming Stu-

dent Government Elections will be successful and will build a strong student government.
