#### Forum features Neu as speaker

Lt. Gov. Arthur Neu was guest speaker at a forum held here last Wednesday. He expressed many of his personal viewpoints on area colleges during the hour long discussion.

The forum was initiated to discuss the amendment (Senate file 1261) passed in the legislature to limit the growth of Liberal Arts programs in area colleges.

Neu was asked many questions by both staff and students concerning the amendment

One student asked if the amendment was supported in the legislature by lobbists from some of the larger colleges in Iowa.

He replied, 'I don't know of any large colleges that supported the amendment

It's common knowledge that they are afraid of area colleges. A fear exists and it is a strong fear. However, in terms of the

amendment they

hands off completely.

Some students voiced the opinion that area colleges should not be limited in the Liberal Arts program. Instead they should be given more appropriations to expand these programs.

Neu said,' I think area colleges have been treated quite well. They haven't faired that bad."

He pointed out that regents and other institutions may have a lid put on appropriations in the future due to declining enrollment.

Neu said that he would never want to stop the growth of area colleges. But when Diane Bidwell, student body vice-president asked who instigated the bill. Neu admitted that it was he and Senator James

Griffin and I did the drafting of the bill. I've never made any secret of that.

Senate lobbist Committee Chairperson Mike Hassig, and Diane Bidwell made arrangements for the forum. Approximately50 people were in attendance.

Times for future forums will be announced on bulletin boards around campus. At the present time, none are scheduled.

#### mmittee proposes to move activity hour

A move to tentatively schedule the activity hour for next fall to Thursdays from ll a.m. to noon, has been initiated by a college committee because the 10 a.m. - II a.m. hour conflicts with certain Career labs, and evidence indicates students would favor the change.

However, the Arts and Sciences and Career Education divisions have scheduled some classes for next fall at the li a.m. time.

Gary Wilcox, member of the Curriculum and Instruction Committee, the committee of College Council proposing the hour change said scheduling of classes is occuring because some Career and Arts and Science programs must meet

curriculum demands. Wilcox, also Dean of Arts and: Sciences, added that only a minimum amount of classes will be held.

Wilcox said the proposal will include a provision to enable Career students in lab sessions or classes from noon to 3 p.m., a chance to partake in activities. Currently, classes are dismissed at 11:50 a.m. and resume at noon. If the proposal is passed, classes wouldn't

begin until 12:15 p.m. Upon request of the Curriculum and Instruction Committee, Ron McClurg, research analyst, conducted a student/faculty survey to find what hour and day the students and faculty would favor. Over 800 students we were polled randomly in each college division including Carroll, Boone and every building on the Ankeny Campus.

Overall, students think Thursday is the best day for the activity hour with 40.1% responding favorably.

The survey also asked for student/faculty opinion of the activity hour concept. 57% of the students agreed the

activity hour concept is worthwhile, 24.8% had no opinion and 32.2% felt the concept is inadequate. These figures pertain to the total

Of the 114 persons responding to the faculty survey, 56.1% believe the concept is worthwhile, 7.1% have no opinion and 36.8% believe the concept is not worthwhile.

The activity hour was originated by Student Senate last Spring and approved by the DMACC Board of Directors. It offers various activity programs and serves as a free hour for students. In it's first stages, Senate proposed the activity hour for Wednesday's at ll a.m. After some modification, the College Council and Board of Directors amended the hour to Thursdays, at 10 a.m.

If the proposal for the a.m. - noon time passes College Council, it must then be approved by Superintendent/President Paul Lowery and the Board of Directors to be enacted officially.

#### Praises Senate for action on bill

We would like to commend the lowa Senate for unanimously passing Senate Biil S534. This bill, now pending in the lowa House of Representatives, would void a law prohibiting the use or sale of tobacco and alcohol on area college campuses, and leave this decision to area college boards.

Because area colleges are organized under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Instruction,(DPI) rules, originally designed for elementary and high school students, are imposed upon area college students

The majority of students on this campus are legally able to vote, marry, serve in the armed forces, and enter into contracts, it is therefore ironic that the state, college board or the DPi would regulate the habits and morals of adults concerning tobacco and alcohol which they can legally buy and use elsewhere.

We hope this bill, initiated by Kirkwood Community

College students, will pass in the House and the DMACC College Board will make a decision appropriate to the needs of responsible adult citizens.



#### Grads operate own store

By Elaine Jordan Two graduates of the DMACC Retail Marketing Program recently opened their own furnitiure store. Bob Thompson and Mike Clark own and operate Clark-Thompson Furniture at 6th and University.

Customers entering the store for the first time won't find fancy room settings, plush, carpeted floors or high-pressure salesmen in expensive three-piece suits. And that's handbills printed to advertise the new store.

They operate on a casual, friendly approach and low prices. It must work because their retail sales for the month of March were

over \$30,000. However, when they were first getting started eight months ago, it was a different story

Clark, 24, and Thompson, 23, met while at DMACC. They worked at the same furniture store for their on-the-job training and combined their merchand graduated last May. Over the into a single, larger store summer, they put together

their ideas and capital and opened their first store on Hull Ave. last September.

"We only paid \$150 a month for that place. That will give you an idea of what it was like," Thompson

They stocked their first store, an old brick building, with only ten pieces of furniture.

Next, came their big, doit-yourself advertising campaign. They had 2,000 handbills printed to

"We propped every one of those handbills up against apartment doors in every major apartment complex in Des Moines and Ankeny," Clark said.

Some people must have read them because Clark-Thompson Furniture was soon doing enough business to open another small store on Forest Ave. After a couple months, they left the two small stores and combined their merchandise at 6th and University.

Clark claims that part of their success was luck. But their time and dedication must have had something to do with it, too.

For example, both men eat their lunches in the store. Also they worked seven days a week until last December, then they started taking off one day a month. Now they take off one day every two weeks.

Their days are busy because they do all the work themselves. This includes loading and unloading furniture, some bookwork, laying out ads, answering the phone and doing what they like bestwaiting on customers.

Their goals include "continuing to expand as we have the last few months," Clark said, and eventually being the biggest furniture store under one roof in the Midwest."




